## **Connecticut State Organization Important Bylaws Amendments**

An email from International **President, Becky Sadowski** was received by our state President on August 29, 2020. The following was approved by the International Administrative Board: "*As a pilot project, the Administrative Board authorized state organizations and the subordinate bodies controlled by their bylaws to transact busines electronically so long as all members can hear each other simultaneously and actively participate in the meeting, and that, during the 2020-2022 biennium, the Administrative Board will evaluate the effectiveness of this pilot project in assisting state organizations to conduct their business."* 

During the time of pandemic restrictions, International was responding to state organizations' appeals to allow states and chapters to conduct **board business** meetings electronically and take action on motions rather than having to separately vote on motions via email or postal mail. Based on the newly revised chapter Standing Rules, all state chapters already have approved **chapter** business meetings that can be held electronically.

In light of this development, the state Bylaws Committee has drafted motions to amend the Connecticut State Organization Bylaws (May 14, 2019) to include this information for the next state convention business meeting and for any state executive board meetings. If there are any changes concerning these motions when the International Constitution is next amended in 2022, the Bylaws Committee will revise accordingly. The following **motions**, which were approved by the State Executive Board on September 26, 2019, will be presented at the state 2021 Spring Convention for approval by membership. Please read carefully and be prepared to vote in April.

## ARTICLE VII MEETINGS, Section A. Convention

**From:** 1. Business of the Connecticut State Organization shall be conducted annually at a convention held at a time and place approved by the Executive Board, for the purpose of taking action on reports, adopting policy, adopting the budget, and amending bylaws. In the odd-numbered years officers shall be elected and the amount of dues established.

**To:** 1. Business of the Connecticut State Organization shall be conducted annually, either in person or electronically, at a convention held at a time and place approved by the Executive Board, for the purpose of taking action on reports, adopting policy, adopting the budget, and amending bylaws. Business shall be conducted electronically so long as all members can hear each other simultaneously and actively participate in the meeting. In the odd-numbered years officers shall be elected and the amount of dues established. *Rationale*: This motion will allow convention business to also be conducted electronically and action can be taken on motions at the meeting as long as all members can hear each other simultaneously and actively participate in the meeting.

## ARTICLE VIII EXECUTIVE BOARD, Section A. State Executive Board

**From:** 3. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be held at least once each year. Special meetings may be called by the president or by a written request of ten (10) members of the Executive Board.

**To**: 3. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be held at least once each year at a physical site or electronically. Business shall be conducted so long as all members can hear each other simultaneously and actively participate in the meeting. Special meetings may be called by the president or by a written request of ten (10) members of the Executive Board.

**<u>Rationale</u>**: This motion allows any state Executive Board meeting to be held electronically in addition to at a physical location, allowing for flexibility to transact business and approve motions electronically with members present on the same day as the meeting.

Points of Light Terry Ziegler, Eta Chapter



From encyclopedias to romance novels, the Groton Public Library is filled with aisles upon aisles of books that allow the citizens of Groton, Connecticut, to dive into new worlds. But for homebound seniors and those who are physically disabled, a trip to the library can be difficult.

That's why for the past 18 years **Terry Ziegler** has brought

the library to them. No matter if their house is five or 20 miles away or if it's raining or a blizzard is brewing, Terry has been delivering books, DVDs and magazines to dozens of seniors and others who are physically unable to make it to the library. One person Terry has been delivering books to for many years is Heather A. Davis, who cannot go to the library by herself because she is in a wheelchair.

"Having the books and movies brought to me means everything to me because they keep me from being bored," Heather added. "I enjoy talking to Terry. She makes me laugh. People ask me if I consider Terry a friend. No! I consider her a sister."

Groton Public Library's Homebound Delivery Service was actually started by Terry's own mother back in the 1970s. "She started a program of delivering books in her '66 Mustang to different senior housing developments because these people couldn't get to the library," Terry recalled. "Once a week, she loaded that car up with huge canvas bags and off she went."

Terry's mother stopped working at the library after 25 years, so the program ended as well. But after Terry retired as a music teacher, she brought the Homebound Delivery Service back to life, becoming the program's sole volunteer. The program started out with just a few deliveries, but today Terry delivers two times a week to about 40 homes. For the seniors who used to be doctors and physicists, the books allow them to continue educating themselves.

And there's some seniors "who just love the romance stuff," Terry said. "There are a lot of people who are alone and this keeps their minds going. It brings them a lot of enjoyment," Terry said.

But with each delivery, Terry does far more than bring books. She's known to bring treats for people's pets, take out their garbage and create meaningful relationships with the people to who she delivers. Even when the library had to shut down during the coronavirus pandemic and Terry couldn't deliver books, she made sure that the seniors who were surely feeling lonelier than ever knew that she was thinking of them.

"When the pandemic resulted in self quarantine, Terry checked in on me by text going above and beyond to make sure I knew that there were still people out there who cared and that one day again soon we would all have our books," said Tenille Martin, who became housebound after two traumatic brain injuries. She even helped create an intergenerational pen pal program during the pandemic so many of the program's senior patrons have been receiving cards, letters and drawings to brighten their day.


"Terry is amazing. She never stops," Kimmerle Balentine, a librarian and the coordinator of the homebound delivery service said. "Word has slowly, but surely, gotten out about this Library service and Terry's passion for it. As a result, three other Connecticut towns – East Lyme, Waterford and Norwich – have used our program and Terry's methods as a model to create their own Homebound Delivery Service programs," Kimmerle added.

On top of her volunteer work with the library, Terry also knits hats that she donates to oncology centers for people undergoing chemotherapy. When asked why she selflessly dedicates her time and efforts for others, she said "because this is humanity. We help each other. This is what we do."

## Margaret (Peggy) DiPersio, Lambda Chapter Died: August 14, 2020



Margaret (Peggy) DiPersio, age 86, passed away on August 14, 2020. She was born on May 23, 1934, to the late Anne (Harrington) and Walter Malone, Sr. Peggy was married to the late Henry DiPersio. She was also predeceased by sister-in-law Muriel Malone.

Peggy grew up in Swansea, MA. She graduated from Joseph Case High School in 1952 and Bridgewater State Teachers College in 1956. Peggy moved to Meriden, CT, where she taught at Israel Putnam School for 36 years. She started as a fifth-grade teacher. In 1970, she received her master's degree in Special Education from Central Connecticut State College; and her remaining years were spent as a learning disabilities specialist.

Peggy was a long-standing member of the Association of American University Women. She was also a member of Holy Angels Church, a member of the Meriden Council of Catholic Women and a

past-president of the Holy Angels Women's Club. Peggy was initiated into the Lambda Chapter of DKG on April 1, 1985. She served as a co-vice president with Sharon Manley from 1992–1994, providing programming for the biennium. Peggy again served as a co-president with Sharon Manley from 1994-1996. They led a Lambda Chapter which had over one hundred members. This was quite a feat considering there was no viable internet at the time. In addition, Peggy helped with the Applebee Fundraisers and was a joyful participant in Lambda's holiday sing-along.

Peggy was an avid reader and enjoyed music and the theater. She had a big heart and enjoyed friendships with many outstanding people. She will be deeply missed, as she was dearly loved. May she rest in peace, and may her memory be a blessing to all.

# Dr. Ann Hanohoe Hines, lota Chapter Died: September 7, 2020



Dr. Ann Hanahoe Hines passed away on September 7, 2020. She was inducted as an Honorary Member of lota Chapter on November 1, 1991. She was born on September 13, 1943 and grew up in the Philadelphia area. Ann received a B.S. degree from Rosemont College and a Doctorate of Medicine from the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine in 1969. She and her husband, Dr. Paul Hines, moved to Danbury in 1972.

In 1974, she founded the Cyril and Mary Hanahoe Memorial Children's Clinic in Danbury to provide medical services to children of the greater Danbury area whose families could not afford a private pediatrician. For the next 35 years, she served as executive director and only staff pediatrician at the clinic, for much of that time without receiving a salary. She retired in June of 2009. Her work was greatly appreciated and she received the National Jefferson Award for Outstanding Public Service, Ladies Home Journal Award, Distinguished Graduate of Philadelphia Catholic Schools Award and multiple honorary degrees.

Ann was devoted to her family and to her Catholic faith. Always a Philadelphian at heart, she loved Tasty Cakes, birch beer and basketball. She was noted among family and friends for her cinnamon rolls.

In extending honorary membership to Dr. Hines, lota recognized that children who are sick cannot learn. Her care for the children of the greater Danbury area and contributions to their health definitely contributed to their abilities to learn.


