

Hopefully, these changes will sustain our CTSO well into the future!



**Dr. Virginia James** Past CTSO State President 1975-1977

Dr. Virginia James entered into rest at the age of 95 on January 20, 2022. Virginia served Lambda Chapter in the roles of president, first vice president, parliamentarian, recording secretary, treasurer, bulletin editor, membership chair, personal growth and services chair, program chair and professional affairs chair. She helped to lead the Connecticut State Organization in the roles of state president, state first vice president, state second vice president and fine arts chair. She served on many committees, presented workshops, organized art displays, led state singing groups, travelled around the state to address various chapters and promoted fine arts through a generous donation, which served as the seed money and creation of the CTSO Dr. Virginia James Art Presentation Fund. She represented the Northeast Region in many capacities including the areas of travel, study and expansion. Internationally, she participated in a flag ceremony, created a topiary tree, presented workshops, served on panels (as panel member, moderator, timekeeper and recorder), helped to create a program manual, composed an original song, Birthday Roses, was awarded an International Scholarship and travelled extensively for conferences and conventions. Virginia was presented the State Achievement Award in 2001.

Virginia graduated from Middlebury College and initially worked as advertising manager for Fafnir Ball Bearings, the first woman to hold that position. After several years in business, she switched to a career in Education and began as an elementary school teacher in Wilton and Westport. This began what would ultimately be 40 years of teaching in Connecticut public schools, primarily in Wallingford. To further her education career, Virginia obtained a Masters degree from Yale University and a Ph.D. in Education of the Gifted and Talented from the University of Connecticut. She completed additional studies through New York University, Southern Connecticut State College and the University of Arizona.

In 1950, Virginia married William H. James, then Superintendent of Schools in Easton, Connecticut. In June 1955, she and William jointly graduated from Yale University – she with her Masters, he with his Ph.D. – and a year later they welcomed their daughter, Hillery. Virginia and William enjoyed 64 years of marriage; it was his passing which prompted Virginia's relocation to Florida to be near Hillery and her husband, Chris.

Virginia loved connecting with others. She enjoyed fellowship with women educators through active participation in Delta Kappa Gamma. She also belonged to DAR and AAUW; was active in church; and treasured neighbors and friends from around the world. Virginia is survived by her daughter, Hillery James-Chung; her son-in-law, Chris Chung; sister, Cindy Parmelee; cousins, nieces and nephews; dear friend and assistant, Judi Evans; and large extended family through Chris, particularly grandson Doron Chung. All were "my family" to Virginia. Members of CTSO extend their sympathies to Virginia's family.



# Julia Marie Velleca Nicefaro, Pi and Zeta Chapters Died: August 2, 2022



As a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, Julia initially belonged to Pi Chapter, where she served as president. She was actively involved in fostering membership and mentoring new members. Julia worked on fundraising, as well as community service projects. As a member of Zeta Chapter, Julia held office as treasurer and continued community service through her DKS membership. What members remember most about Julia is her enthusiasm and willingness to step forth whenever there was need, she would cover a CTSO Executive Board meeting, take minutes at a moment's notice and work with chapter members to facilitate meetings and special events.

Julia was a graduate of Hillhouse High School and New Haven Teachers College before receiving her master's degree from Southern Connecticut State University. She spent her career as an educator in the New Haven School System teaching at several schools before becoming the librarian at Hillhouse High School and at Southern Connecticut State University.

Julia had a passion for volunteering; and after retirement, she was the longtime president of the St. Trofimena Society and a past president of the Hospital of St. Raphael Women's Auxiliary, volunteering alongside her husband Ralph for many years at the St. Raphael's thrift shop.

Mildred was a member of many civic organizations and was honored as a Woman of

Achievement in 1963 by the Quota Club of CT. She was actively involved in many activities of the Hartford County 4-H. During World War II Mildred was a lookout to watch for enemy aircraft on Chippens Hill in Bristol. Along with her mother and sister, she was an early member of the Edgewood Women's Club, the local Camera Club and the Bristol Historical Society. Mildred and her sister were enthusiastic members of the Friendly Westerners Square Dance Club; and during her early years, she was an avid downhill skier. Mildred's primary passion was gardening, as exemplified by the beautiful gardens surrounding her home.


### Help Share the Pieces for Peace! The Curriculum of Hope for a Peaceful World

They participated in an intensive week of leadership/management development with McCombs School of Business. ### **Update from Revitalization Planning**

Over the past few weeks, Ann Grosjean and I have been meeting to assemble the information gleaned from our initial Revitalization Planning Meeting and subsequent sessions with DKG members during the Fall Conference to organize the suggestions and insight from our members. The comments provided by our members during these meetings have been rich and innovative, reflecting the commitment and pride in being a member of DKG.

After reviewing the "Strategic Plan-The Connecticut State Organization DKG 2019-2029" there is a clear alignment with:

#### Goal 1: Support Members

- 1.A.1 Create New Membership Opportunities,
- 1.B. Enhance Existing membership opportunities.

#### **Goal 3: Build on Resources**

- 3.A. Create New Resources
- 3.B. Enhance Existing Resources.

During a recent Executive Board meeting, it was clear that membership is critical to the financial viability of our organization and the human capacity to develop leadership and resources for continuous improvement.

When reviewing the data and information gathered, three topics of focus have emerged to attract members to DKG:

**Recruitment** of new or former members, including strategies for initial outreach, communication and marketing to

potential members about DKG and the benefits of membership at the International, State and Chapter levels. Many members are finding it difficult to reach out to current teachers since they are no longer working in schools.

- **Retention** of new and current members, through mentoring of new members, program planning that appeals to the shared interests of all members and ensuring that new members feel welcome and assimilate into the group.
- **Relevance** of how DKG can attract a range of members who move through various career stages and how the

organization is responding to active teachers, retired teachers, collegiate/novice teachers and homebound

members. Strategies include meeting formats (In-person and Zoom) for programs (at the state and chapter level) planned to address the range of needs of members. Also deliberate planning as a Chapter to vary the days and times of meetings that take into consideration school district calendars, school staff meetings and

religious observances. As the Next-Gen committee provides insight into the demands on current teachers with an emphasis on care to not overbook members in any month or expect in-person attendance for all meetings. The Action Plan can continue to be a plan that is transformational in nature.

The format of the Revitalization Plan to be provided includes an action plan for each SMART Goal (Specific Measurable Achievable Relevant and Timebound) with specific strategies that provide a menu of options for chapters to use in accomplishing the goals for membership.

### **CTSO Bylaws Amendments**

The Connecticut State Organization Bylaws Committee will present two motions for amendments to the Connecticut State Organization Bylaws (April 24, 2021) at the CTSO Spring Convention (May 6, 2023). **Amendments in bold.** 

**MOTION 1:** The Bylaws Committee presents a motion to approve the following amendment to the Connecticut State Organization Bylaws. It has been approved by an affirmative vote at the February 11, 2023 meeting of the DKG Connecticut State Organization Executive Board.

### ARTICLE VII, MEETINGS

#### Current: Section A. Convention

1. Business of the Connecticut State Organization shall be conducted annually, either in person or electronically, at a convention held at a time and place approved by the Executive Board, for the purpose of taking action on reports, adopting policy, adopting the budget, and amending bylaws. Business shall be conducted electronically so long as all members can hear each other simultaneously and actively participate in the meeting. In the odd-numbered years officers shall be elected and the amount of dues established.

To:

1. Business of the Connecticut State Organization shall be conducted annually, either in person or electronically, at a convention held at a time and place approved by the Executive Board, for the purpose of taking action on reports, adopting policy, adopting the budget, and amending bylaws. Business shall be conducted electronically so long as all members can hear each other simultaneously and actively participate in the meeting. In the odd-numbered years officers shall be elected and the amount of dues established.

- a. The decision made by the Executive Board for holding a meeting in person or electronically should consider budgetary constraints, health concerns, natural disasters, and other relevant topics.
- b. If an unforeseen circumstance arises the CTSO president and CTSO first vice president have the authority to make changes to the meeting including date, location, meeting virtually or in person.

#### Current: Section B. Other Meetings

1. An annual Professional Conference shall be held for the general membership, preferably in the fall. **To :** 

1. An annual Professional Conference shall be held for the general membership, preferably in the fall, either in person or electronically, at a conference held at a time and place approved by the Executive Board. The meeting shall be held electronically so long as all members can hear each other simultaneously and actively participate in the meeting.

- a. The decision made by the Executive Board for holding a meeting in person or electronically should consider budgetary constraints, health concerns, natural disasters, and other relevant topics.
- b. If an unforeseen circumstance arises, the CTSO president and CTSO first vice president have the authority to make changes to the meeting including date, location, meeting virtually or in person.

Rationale: The additional language states considerations to hold a meeting virtually and the circumstances when the president and vice president, not the Executive Board, would make this decision. A virtual meeting provides members unable to attend an in person the opportunity to attend and is a cost saving to members and to the Connecticut State Organization.

**MOTION 2:** The Bylaws Committee presents a motion to approve the following amendment to the Connecticut State Organization Bylaws. It has been approved by an affirmative vote at the February 11, 2023 meeting of the DKG Connecticut State Executive Board.

### ARTICLE X: ACTIVITIES

#### Current: Section D. Publications

1. A state newsletter *The Keynote* shall be published (in print and/or electronic Form) four times a year. Print versions will be mailed to members.

<u>To:</u>

- 1. A state newsletter *The Keynote* shall be published in electronic form **a minimum of two** times a year; **published in the spring and in the fall.**
- 2. If there are amendments to the Bylaws and/or Standing Rules, a spring edition must be published electronically, posted on the CTSO website, and distributed to members at least 30 days prior to the spring convention.
  - a. CTSO President or her designee will email a copy to all chapter presidents at least 30 days prior to the spring convention.
  - b. The chapter president or her designee will email a copy of *the Keynote* to all chapter members who can receive information electronically.
  - c. The chapter president or her designee will copy and mail *The Keynote* to all chapter members who cannot receive information electronically.

Rationale: The decision by the CTSO Executive Board to publish The Keynote electronically eliminates the need to print and mail copies of The Keynote to all members. This will reduce CT State Organization expenses in a time of budget constraints. A requirement of only two issues of The Keynote does not eliminate the importance of ongoing communication. This change provides the time and flexibility to explore and consider alternative ways to effectively communicate with members. Additional language clarifies who is responsible for distribution of the Keynote.

# Archiving Our CT State Organization History at the University of Connecticut Dodd Center

We have been negotiating with the University of Connecticut Dodd Center in Storrs to move our Connecticut State Organization – previously known as Alpha Kappa State – collections from a storage unit in Wethersfield to their Archives. They have agreed to house our historical documents. In addition to saving a significant amount of money annually, this is quite an honor. We will be housed among their 1100 other collections. When **Pat O'Connell Buckley** and I met with two Archivists at UConn they stated that they are especially interested in the changes within our organization over time. They were also interested in our human rights and global education priorities. They will store binders of our Keynotes for the last thirty years, which **Carol Beam**, our retiring Keynote Editor, has so lovingly organized with newsletters from previous years; two scrap books; programs from Conferences and Conventions as well as Celebration of Life and Achievement Award booklets; our Constitution and By Laws; Member Memory Books and chapter histories. Moving forward, they will also store our *Keynotes* virtually with a link. They are also interested in Finance Committee Reports and some end-of-year reports, which will be saved electronically. You will be able to visit the Archives at UConn and see and copy the materials, but they will not be able to leave the building. As they digitize the collection, it will be accessible online.

**Please note:** There were many other special paraphernalia in the storage unit. Items included candlesticks, bowls, a pitcher, some jewelry, gavels, *Heritage* - three volume series, DKG banners, etc. There are also group photographs of members present at Northeast Regional Conferences in Hartford. For the materials which will not be placed in the Archive, we plan to offer them to chapters who might need them and then have drawings for the other items at our Spring Convention. Whatever is not taken will be up for grabs. We hope to close the storage unit by May 6<sup>th</sup>. There is a book entitled, *Pioneer Women*, with dolls and a skit. We are considering donating them to a Connecticut museum. Please let us know if you have any ideas how we might use/donate other items to preserve our history. We have a rich 84-year history, and it is important to preserve our legacy! Thank you to **Pat O'Connell Buckley** and **Joan Konareski** who assisted in this project!
