DKG and members of the Connecticut State Organization will sponsor a Bingo on Wednesday, July 31st, at Foxwoods Resort and Casino in conjunction with the 2019 International Global Awareness Conference, hosted by the Connecticut State Organization.

This event will begin at 6:30 p.m. (Hall opens at 4:00 p.m.) and is open to the public. Admission is \$15 per ticket. It is a DKG Emergency Fund Benefit. The Emergency Fund was established following a flood in 1948 which destroyed Vanport, Oregon. A plea for help in the *DKG News* resulted in more that \$3,000 that became the Emergency Fund. The fund continues as natural disasters affect members. Contributions demonstrate the Society's genuine spiritual fellowship. \$104,000 was distributed during the 2017-18 fiscal year.

We hope that our Connecticut State Organization members and others will support this event. If more than 300 tickets are sold, \$10 from every ticket will be donated to the DKG Emergency Fund. 
Our organization will be making changes this spring that will move us into the future. We will be voting on some of the changes at our Spring Convention in May. Most of the changes will bring our Standing Rules and By-laws in line with the recently revised International governing documents.

One of the biggest changes will be the method of dues collection. The time that we pay dues will change. We will pay our annual dues and fees no later than June 30, 2019. Chapter treasurers will start collecting in the spring. This new time line will bring dues payment in line with the fiscal year of Delta Kappa Gamma. The Society has been operating for months each year without incoming dues. This change will give the Society a true vision of its operating budget. It will make for a shorter year of benefits for this year, then the following and every subsequent year will be one full fiscal year. Our State Treasurer Donna Chaney and a representative from International will be giving chapter treasurers more of the details of the new dues process this spring.

There will also be a change in the language related to payments for members joining during the year. For membership or reinstatement between July 1 and December 31, the member will pay an induction fee (new members only), dues and fees for the current year. For membership on or after January 1, the member shall pay one-half the international membership dues. This was an area that needed clarification. We will also need to look at the state and chapter dues to see if they can be pro-rated as well. As with any big change, it will take time and some understanding to implement but will be good for the organization.

I hope this winter and the recent holidays have been good to you and your families. I look forward to the spring with renewed growth and warmer weather.

Lighten up! Dealing with Stress with 4 Daily Strategies



Strategies to Deal with Stress Presented by Jeanne Morascini

"Please take a few minutes now to identify what there is in your life that bothers you or creates stress." This is a question that was presented on paper to each participant in the Breakout Session, *Strategies to Deal with Stress* presented by **Jeanne Morascini** (Theta Chapter). Jeanne's work with peace and happiness for over forty years certainly qualified her to address this topic.

Jeanne listened carefully as some participants volunteered to share instances of what created stress in their lives. After commenting briefly on some of the individual responses, Jeanne proceeded to relax us with her calm and peaceful voice, introduced us to some deep breathing exercises and then began to discuss various aspects dealing with stress in one's life.

What is it in your life that makes you unhappy and that stresses you out? Could it be that your expectations are too high? If so, change them. Stress occurs when the demands one faces supersede the actions taken. It's important to relax and prioritize in your life, as oftentimes we cause our own stress by how we deal with it. Always remind yourself to apply the three Cs because you <u>C</u>an, <u>C</u>ontrol your <u>C</u>hoices, and the earlier you do so the better it will be for you.

Change occurs in everyone's life and often results in stressful situations. The earlier you accept the change the better it is for you. Worry accompanies stress, but statistics reveal that only 8% of what we worry about actually happens. So, if you feel stressed you must get rid of it.

The question then becomes, how do we rid ourselves of the stress we feel? One way is to find humor and laugh more frequently. The physical act of laughing triggers an increase in endorphins in the brain chemicals known for their feel-good effect. A good idea is to collect funny jokes and share them with others. Paste them on your kitchen cabinets as you work around the kitchen and have yourself a good laugh!

Turn negative thoughts into positive ones. Throw the negative ones out the window! Acquire a peaceful mindset. Be grateful for what you have, as so many have so much less than you. Remember that grateful people are happy people. Listen to peaceful music, light a scented candle, choose a take-out dinner once or twice a week when you are busiest, compliment someone, hold someone's hand, listen to someone else's concerns and make time for yourself as it's important to your whole family. Strive to live in peace and ultimately peace will live in you.

Google App Basics Presented by Emily Lozinak



The doors to many of the Google apps available for use on the Google platform were introduced and demonstrated by **Emily Lozinak** (Omicron Chapter). Those of us lucky enough to be in her breakout session had a great time learning and doing. First, be aware that you need to have a Google account to access these different opportunities. That is easy to do and should be your first step in accessing these tools.

Using Google Drive and Google Docs, you can create, share and co-edit documents with friends and colleagues right in your browser. If you save your original document, you can edit the second copy with your co-workers. You will be able to download the copy in varied formats, see the changes that all have made and even go back to an earlier version. There are many add-ons that enable you to insert tables, images, drawings, etc.

Google forms is the place to go when you need to set up surveys. You can create forms (i.e. conference registrations), edit and update them in Google forms. This app will break down responses and even send them to a spreadsheet. There are templates and many options available for your use. You can filter [sort and exclude] data and use a special link to send out the survey to others. Recipients do not need to have Google Docs to return the surveys.

Other apps include Google Sheets that helps you to create spreadsheets, Google Slides that builds presentations and Google Drawings that creates charts and diagrams. Members now have the ability to explore and use these tools.

Cupcake Decorating—Again a Hit! Presented by Terry Pearce

Participants were greeted by Terry Pearce, a science teacher with thirty-five years experience at middle and high school levels. The tables were set with individual boxes of six cupcakes and three icingfilled bags with different tips. Terry guided members through each step of the process of decorating cupcakes to look like they came from a commercial bakery. She explained that in lieu of whole cakes, fancy cupcakes are the rage today. Terry graciously shared her recipe for buttercream frosting and her tip for baking flat (instead of domed) cupcakes to accommodate piled frosting - using any boxed mix, fill cupcake pans three-quarters full and bake at 325 degrees instead of 350 degrees as recommended on the package. Everyone left with masterpieces to show off and the icing bags to practice at home.

Terry started decorating cakes when she took an adult education course with her mother many years ago. From then on, she is mostly self-taught, learning new techniques on her own. She showed a portfolio of photos of her lovely creations over the years. Terry is foremost a teacher who enjoys sharing her enthusiasm, creativity and expertise. She made this session a fun and relaxing learning experience!

Fall Conference

How Childhood Trauma and Toxic Stress Impact a Child's Present Life Presented by Dr. Jo Ann Freiberg

Eighteen members of the Delta Kappa Gamma Connecticut State Organization participated in the presentation, *How Childhood Trauma and Toxic Stress Impact a Child's Present Life*, which was facilitated by CT State Department of Education consultant Jo Ann Freiberg. Through a series of slides, videos and activities, Dr. Freiberg demonstrated how Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) can lead to toxic stress, which negatively impacts a child's ability to learn and manage his/her behavior. After participants assessed their own ACEs score through completion of a brief survey tool, Westbrook Superintendent Pat Ciccone posted the results of these anonymously-scored surveys via pink Post-It notes on a chart.

Participants then completed a second tool, the CYW Adverse Childhood Experiences Questionnaire, "on a specific child we know" who has displayed concerning behaviors or academic failures. These scores were also put on yellow Post-Its which were then juxtaposed next to the pink ones for comparisons and discussion. One takeaway was that the presence of a caring adult at school was paramount in school connectedness, which ultimately lowers teen pregnancy rates, drug use and violent/deviant behavior. On a positive note, various treatments can be successful in assisting these children in overcoming childhood trauma and fostering resiliency. In closing, Dr. Freiberg advocated for universal screening of children for ACEs. She also reiterated her mantra: *No bears in school*.

Fiction Book Talk: *A Piece of the World* Presented by Dr. Jacqueline Abbott

Workshops

Attendees at the Fiction Book Talk workshop participated in an active discussion of *A Piece of the World*, facilitated by **Dr. Jacqueline Abbott** (Rho Chapter). The story by Christina Baker Kline focuses on *Christina's World*, a painting by Andrew Wyeth in 1948. The story takes place in rural Maine and moves back and between timelines and brings to life a little-known corner of history.

Young Wyeth first visited the coastal Maine farmhouse of Christina Olson and was intrigued by its history. The Wyeth family spent every summer in Maine and was given permission by the family to come every day to sketch the property. Christina and "Andy" develop an unusual, casual friendship. The story moves back in time to Christina's childhood and her family's move to the weather-beaten farmhouse.






Barbara Bolcer Torcellini, Zeta Chapter Died June 24, 2018
