We will give/ mail you the resources and the classroom book; and you will, in person, pass this along to the teacher by March 1, 2022. We are hoping the teachers will use the materials during the spring of 2022.

### WWII Through Story and Song Presented by Mary Ellen Ulatowski, Lambda Chapter President

This workshop gave a short history of WWII. It featured songs of the era that helped to illustrate the mood of America at the time, such as optimism after the Depression (Sunny Side of the Street), sadness over devastation in Europe (Last Time I Saw Paris), push for buying bonds and stamps (Buy A Bond) and patriotism (What America Means to Me, God Bless America). The breakout concluded with Mary Ellen expressing the hope that history will not repeat itself and that peace will prevail throughout the world.

### Writing Stories We Should Share and Some We Probably Shouldn't Presented by Dr. Kathleen Lozinak Omicron Chapter

Kathleen began by sharing her philosophy of writing. When we were in school, most of us learned to write by following the same prompt and then received corrections. Her belief is that the most important aspect of the writing process is sharing.

Kathleen shared many creative examples of "writing starters", followed by generating a list (gathering) and then sharing one sentence. For example: list your favorite people, and think of stories you might want to tell about one or more of them. Then share: "One person I might want to write about is \_\_\_\_\_. The story I'd like to tell is \_\_\_\_ (one sentence)."

She also shared strategies for memoir writing. Kathleen suggested starting with thinking of emotions that are unusual for you. Then tell about times that you felt these emotions and include lessons that you learned. Another example was to write about the first (or last) time you did something. Include both positive and negative experiences.

Kathleen concluded by sharing more examples of gathering strategies. To name a few: stories that happened to you that you wished turned out differently, stories that you wish were written, stories that have an important theme or life lesson.

The participants in Kathleen's workshop enjoyed the interactive format and were eager to pursue writing using some of the many strategies that she shared.

Along the way, she shared fascinating examples of her father's family tree dating back to Russia. Her first step was collecting data from family members and data bases like Ancestry.Com. Next she organized the data by storing older documents and saving information digitally.

Finally, she displayed the narratives and pictures using a template and the program *BookWright* as a guide. All participants were very impressed with Lena's accomplishment and were inspired to research their own family trees.

### Book Talk: *Lost Roses* Moderated by Jackie Abbott Rho Chapter

Jackie opened the session with a brief virtual tour of the Bellamy-Ferriday House, one of the settings in this World War I novel. Today this home is a museum located in Bethlehem, CT. We also "visited" the garden where the Katharina Zeimet rose, carried by Sofya Streshnayva from Russia to Paris to Long Island, NY, continues to grow today.

Thoughtful questions led participants into the examination of the courage and perseverance demonstrated throughout the novel by the three women at its center. Lively discussion followed.

At the end of the session, Jackie asked how each one of us would rate the book. It was unanimous-Great! And that's how we rated our presenter, Jackie Abbott!

## Workshop Summaries

### Sing a (Virtual) New Song Workshop Presented by Allison Fay Beta Chapter

Attending concerts of choral music since March of 2020 and Covid was curtailed greatly. Diehard musicians and fans managed to find a way around this situation by turning to technology. The *Sing a (Virtual) New Song* workshop presented by Allison Fay, a highly sought-after classical soprano, conductor, accompanist, voice teacher and vocal coach, taught us how these virtual concerts were made.

Allison gave us a brief history of virtual choirs. The concept was invented by composer and conductor [Eric Whitacre](#) a decade or so ago. His first virtual choir was featured in a [viral 2011 TED Talk](#), and recently he released Virtual Choir 6, with a mind-boggling 17,572 singers from 129 countries across the world performing [Sing Gently as One](#).

Allison defined a virtual choir as one formed by both young and old, whose members do not meet physically but who work together online from separate places to create musical experiences through the use of technology and various social media. Many instructional "how to" videos can be found online along with downloadable apps that exist to assist you like *Audacity*, *Garage Band* and *We Video*. The director must clearly make the steps and expectations known to each participant in the very beginning. Allison explained to us in detail the necessary steps:

- Create a lead track, a guide track, and a video guide;
- Send all the materials to each participant including a long list of specific instructions which must include the submission date;
- Collect the singers' recordings checking and recording in a list as each is received;
- Edit and mix audio tracks followed by editing the video tracks;
- Combine audio and video parts and export the project as an mp4 file;
- At this point the video can be uploaded to YouTube or streaming media of your choice.
- Sit back and enjoy your creation!

We were treated to her virtual concert which featured the sixteen-member choir of the First Congregational Church of Stratford singing Mozart's *Ave Verum Corpus!* What a pleasure it was to sit back and enjoy this beautiful rendition of a truly inspiring work of art. Kudos to you, Allison, for a spectacular virtual performance and thank you for sharing your work and expertise with us – a delightfully informative presentation at a conference dedicated to the Arts!

### The Family Memory Project Presented by Dr. Kathleen Lozinak Omicron Chapter

Dr. Lozinak conducted this workshop which focused on simple strategies we can use to get family members, who may be struggling with memory issues, to recall and share events, thoughts, and feelings from their past. With only 30-40 minutes per week, we can gather stories from years ago and discover new and interesting things about our loved ones.

It was suggested that we use a recording device to capture these memories for future generations and help prompt responses when necessary. Also, don't take one-word answers. Use phrases like "can you tell me more about..." or "how did you feel then" to elicit more detailed stories.

Workshop members were asked to share stories from their past as examples of how to proceed with these walks down memory lane. Some of the prompts used were:

- "Tell me the earliest memory you have."
- "Can you tell me about some places where you used to spend a lot of time?"
- "When were you super happy... or very angry... or excited... or sad..."
- "Tell me some places where you've visited."
- "What are some objects that were really important to you growing up?"
- "What events stand out from your past?"

Remember to take good notes, record when possible and prompt for details to allow their tales to unfold. Enjoy your loved ones while you still have them and help preserve their stories. It only takes a little time to listen.

She guided us through a website ([rhymezone.com](http://rhymezone.com)) that aids writers in finding rhyme words, alternate words and words with different beats. We had time to write and share a short poem of 4 lines. Finally, we were encouraged to write and submit our work to the DKG Fine Arts Gallery.

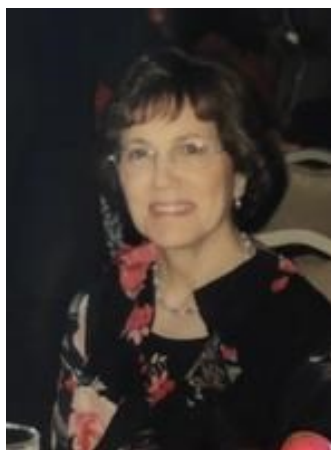

The money raised is given as book grants to area students who are interested in pursuing a career in education. Each year, a total of \$1,500 is given to three different students who are seniors in area high schools.

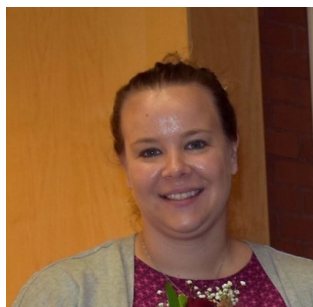

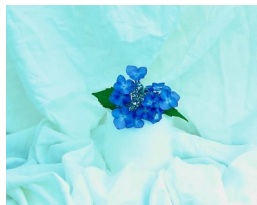
